



March 2022

We Welcome Spring!

Unsurprisingly, the spring season gets its name from the verb "spring." It's a nod to the flowers and plants springing up, springing open and bursting into blossom. Meteorological spring starts March 1st and ends May 31st. *The Farmer's Almanac* predicts drier than normal spring weather this year.

Spring or Vernal Equinox

The word *equinox* comes from the Latin words for "equal night"-aequus (equal) and nox (night). An *equinox* is one of two times of the year when the amount of daylight and nighttime hours are just about of equal length. The vernal *equinox* marks the start of spring.

Here in the Northern Hemisphere, we welcome the astronomical spring on **March 20, 2022**, at precisely 11:33am EDT, with the arrival of the spring equinox. After this date, the Northern Hemisphere begins to be tilted more toward the sun, resulting in increasing daylight hours and warming temperatures.

The March Full Moon

As the temperature begins to warm and the ground begins to thaw, earthworm casts appear heralding the return of robins, thus the origin of March's full Moon named the *Full Worm Moon*.

The more northern Native American tribes knew this Moon as the *Full Crow Moon*, when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter.

It was also referred to as the Full Crust Moon because snow cover becomes crusty from falling by day and freezing at night.

The Full Sap Moon marking the time of sapping maple trees is another variation.

To settlers, it was also known as the Lenten Moon and it was the last full Moon of winter.

March 22nd will mark the official end of the towns of North Smithfield's and Lincoln's 150th birth year. However, due to the pandemic, some celebrations will continue beyond.

NSHA'S PRESERVATION & RESTORATION



Forestdale School (190 School Street)

APG has installed the restored window sashes. We applied for \$145K in grants to install emergency stairs, replace the roof and recreate the cupola. Petro has removed and replaced the old fuel oil tank.

Memorial Town Building (1 Main Street)

Renovations continue at the Memorial Town Building. One of our community service workers recently started to take up carpet upstairs. UV film will also be installed on all of the windows to cut down on the solar effect of the sun's rays on the artifacts in the building.





Heritage Hall (101 Greene Street)

New storm windows for the stained-glass windows are installed. They will dramatically reduce energy costs in this building. Local electrician, Roland Menard, offered to donate his time to moved the unused fire alarm radio box at the Memorial building to Heritage Hall

NS Zoning Ordinance Amendment Local Historic Districts

The NSHA, is working with the NS Historic District Commission (NS HDC) and asked the Planning Board to consider an amendment to the ordinance that reduces the administrative and financial burden of property owners who agree to let the town designate their historic buildings as an individual local historic district. The Planning Board will vote on a recommendation at their next meeting.



Thomas Sayles Local Historic District

(152 Grange Road)

The NS HDC will ask the NS Town Council to create a new local Historic District for the 18th century Thomas Sayles Farm, currently known as Gardner's Farm. It's

one of only two remaining farms in town with free ranging cattle. The NS HDC plans to present the proposal to the Town Council as soon as it considers the Zoning Ordinance Amendment.



Dorr Rebellion Artifacts

Jon Peirce, a local master furniture maker, has offered to donate a display case for the 1842 Dorr Rebellion Flag that once belonged to the Slatersville Grenadiers.





Historic Cemetery OF The Month Joanna Comstock Lot By Lynne Pelletier

The Joanna Comstock lot is also known as NS056 and it is located on Premisy Hill Road in North Smithfield. It is a family cemetery named after the matriarch of the Comstock family. There are 6 memorials with engraved headstones; however, according to the Rhode Island Historical Cemeteries Commission, there are actually 13 burials here. Some of the graves are marked only with field stones.

The individuals buried here include: Joanna Aldrich Comstock who was born July 5, 1781 in Smithfield and was the daughter of Samuel Aldrich and Rachel Bassett. Joanna married her second cousin, Arioch Comstock on December 25, 1800 and they were the parents of 5 children. Joanna died at age 87 on August 28, 1868.



Arioch Comstock was the son of Stephen Comstock and Hannah Aldrich. He was born March 10, 1770 in Smithfield and died at age 65 on May 3, 1835. Two of the Comstock children are also buried with their parents. A son, Fenner Comstock, was born in 1814 and died at age 62 on July 13, 1876. He was a farmer and he never married. A daughter, Joanna Aldrich Marsh, was born November 19, 1823 and she died of a stroke at age 74 on October 19, 1897. Her husband, William Marsh, is buried beside her. William Marsh was the son of Nahum Marsh and Sabra Dexter and he was born in Smithfield in 1814 and died at age 58 of heart disease on April 28, 1872. William and Joanna married May 13, 1866 and had no children. Husband and wife are memorialized on a double headstone.



The final, and perhaps most interesting grave, belongs to grandson, Frederick N. Comstock. His military headstone is for a veteran of the Civil War and it does not list the date of his death. Frederick enlisted in the military on October 5, 1861 and then re-enlisted as veteran volunteer in company B of the 3rd Rhode Island Heavy Artillery on January 30, 1864. Military records show he mustered out of service on August 27, 1865. He married Harriet Miller of Woonsocket on January 24, 1868 and in August of 1869 they had a son named Frederick Napoleon. By June of 1870 when the United States Federal Census was taken, Harriet is alone with her child. The only other bit of information found for Frederick is from a record for the headstone for Frederick's grave. This source lists the headstones that were provided for deceased Union Civil War veterans and it indicates that Frederick died on May 25, 1879. No death record can be found for Frederick in the state of Rhode Island. Could Frederick have died in another state and why is there no record of him with his wife and child? Is Frederick truly buried here or is this headstone only a memorial for him? It remains a mystery.

When NSHA cemetery volunteers first approached this cemetery for restoration, it was in poor shape. Joanna's stone lay broken against a tree, Fenner's stone was lying in the grass and Arioch's slate headstone was broken into shards and was unreadable. All of the stones were cleaned and repaired as best as could be and then reset into place. Unfortunately, a piece of Joanna's headstone remains missing and therefore it could not be placed into its base securely so it was set into the ground instead. Arioch's headstone was broken beyond repair and what could be saved was set into place with the broken pieces close by. Lastly, what was thought to be a small headstone was actually discovered to be the footstone marker for Arioch's grave when a volunteer discovered the initials A.C. carved into its surface. It proved that this was Arioch's resting place beside his wife, Joanna. One final issue remains however, the double headstone of Joanna Aldrich Marsh and her husband William Marsh appears to be facing in the wrong direction. While the remainder of the graves all face eastward as was the tradition, the Marsh grave faces west. Since it is impossible to know if this was done intentionally or if the grave had been moved at one point, it was decided to leave this headstone as it is. The cemetery is now once again a peaceful resting place for the Comstock family.

NSHS student parking lot on Grange Road.






Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor


