

Rediscovering a Town Landmark by Al Menard

Recently, the archives made an intriguing discovery—a partial diary belonging to Dr. Metcalf Marsh.

Dr. Marsh, remembered as a dedicated village doctor in Slatersville and an associate of Thomas Dorr, left behind valuable firsthand accounts of his experiences and observations.

Among Dr. Marsh's diary entries, one dated July 1, 1836, stands out. He writes: "Very warm weather. Smoky atmosphere – in the evening went to 'Love Rock' with some Ladies but did not fall in love ---" This lighthearted note not only reveals a slice of daily life but also hints at a local landmark that was once significant for social gatherings.

Despite living in a local boarding house and remaining single for another seven years, Dr. Marsh's visits to "Love Rock" provoke curiosity—how often did he return to this spot?

The discovery raised a compelling question: Where exactly is Love Rock? Staff at the NSHA office could not recall any landmark by that name. Initial speculation pointed to Cobble Rock, a large boulder in the woods behind St. Antoine's Nursing Residence. While Cobble Rock was a popular gathering spot, it was not typically associated with romantic meetings or referenced as a place for lovers.

To solve the mystery, attention turned to local historical sources. Walter Nebiker's, "History of North Smithfield" provides insight: "Lover's Rock,' atop the cliff, is a pleasant lookover made up of a large ledge, where legend has it, a pair of lovers were dropped into the river when a large piece of rock broke off, forever trapping the lovers underneath." Concerning locale, Nebiker also mentions that "Downstream a short distance, at the 'Three Corners,' where the Branch River joins the Blackstone, clambakes were regularly held by Blackstone mill villagers up to World War I."

Further investigation by NSHA members revealed that Lover's Rock appears on an old town map from 1947, confirming its location near the Blackstone River above the junction with the Branch River.

Entries like Dr. Marsh's diary provide invaluable glimpses into the daily lives and traditions of Slatersville's past residents. Although the landmark known as Lover's Rock may not be widely recognized by newer generations, its story persists in local folklore. The legend continues to inspire curiosity and invites further research into the romantic history of North Smithfield.

A HOME FOR THE NORTH SMITHFIELD HERITAGE ASSOCIATION

On July 14, 1975, when Abner Bailey, president of the North Smithfield Heritage Association, signed a lease with the North Smithfield School Committee to lease the old Forestdale School for \$1.00 a year, the search for a headquarters for the Association was ended.

During the past few years several places which might have housed the Association were investigated, but never acquired. When it became apparent that the Eleanor Howard kindergarten was to be moved from the Forestdale School, the Association expressed an interest in the building. As a result of our combined efforts, and because the Association serves in the public interest, the hope of acquiring the building became a reality.

The Forestdale School was built in 1877 on land donated by the Forestdale Manufacturing Company and was originally the Branch School in District 3. It was one of the last one-room school houses built in North Smithfield and housed primary grades until 1958, when the kindergarten from the Kendall Dean School was transferred here. The kindergarten was established in the Kendall Dean School in 1936 as a remembrance to Eleanor Howard through an endowment in the will of her granddaughter, Minnie Palmer Dean, and subsequently was known as the Eleanor Howard kindergarten. When the Forestdale School closed last year, the Eleanor Howard kindergarten was returned to its original location, the Kendall Dean School. The popular name of the school as the "Eleanor Howard School" is not correct, and the school will simply be known hereafter by it's proper name, the Forestdale School.


In 1958, the cupola was removed and the entrance updated but otherwise the 98-year-old one and a half story Late Victorian bracketed style wood clapboarded structure has remained relatively unchanged.

The Association hopes to put the building to good use, so that it will continue serving an educational use as an interpretive center, to some degree a museum, to house the growing accumulation of photographs, books and other written material in our archives, and to house the archeology project. All plans at this stage are tentative. The executive committee recently established two new committees to handle the responsibilities of our new acquisition. A House Stewardship Committee, a standing committee, will have the responsibility for maintenance of the building and grounds, while a Restoration Committee will provide ideas and plans for the best use of the old school building.

Historic Cemetery of the Month

NS 53 The George Arnold Burial Ground by Lynne Pelletier

The George Arnold Burial Ground is located behind a home on Indigo Farm Road. The lot is approximately 20' by 60' and includes 9 graves belonging to members of the Arnold family dating from 1822 to 1876. In 2008, when the cemetery was recorded by Roger Beaudry, he noted that all of the head stones had fallen over. Thankfully, in 2019, the NSHA cemetery team, along with the homeowner, Bill Nangle, began to restore this cemetery. All of the headstones have been cleaned, repaired, and returned to their original upright positions.

The namesake of the cemetery was George Arnold, born on December 2, 1782, in Smithfield, RI, to Eleazer Arnold and Mary Aldrich Arnold. George married Mary Taylor Evans on November 6, 1808, and they had at least 3 daughters. George died at age 39 on April 18, 1822, in Smithfield. His headstone is engraved with a poignant epitaph:

"Farewell to all my days are o'er, With you I meet on earth no more, Come to weep or shed a tear, Grieving friends and children dear."

Mary Taylor Evans Arnold was born in about 1787 and was the daughter of Richard Evans and his wife, Sarah. She was the mother of Lucina E. Arnold Colwell (1816-1876), Sarah S. Arnold (unknown-1841), both buried here, and Mary Ann Arnold Appleby, who is buried with her husband, Thomas Appleby, in Oxford, Massachusetts. Mary Evans Arnold died at age 53 on April 19, 1840. Mary's epitaph reads:

"Beloved in life lamented in her death, Calm and resigned she yielded up her breath." Freed from life's cares and every worldly pain, Our loss we trust is her eternal gain."

Jonathan Arnold was George's younger brother, and he was born on March 17, 1784, in Smithfield, RI. On February 12, 1809, Jonathan married Jerusha Aldrich, and they had at least 4 children; 3 of whom are buried here. Jonathan died at age 76 on April 11, 1860, in Sutton, Massachusetts. Jonathan was a farmer and had previously lived in Cumberland before moving to Sutton.

Jerusha Aldrich Arnold was born in about 1788 and was the daughter of Stephen Aldrich and Jerusha Bartlett. It is unclear if Jerusha was born in Smithfield or if she was born in Southwick, Massachusetts, where records indicate that she married Jonathan. Jerusha was the mother of Maria Arnold (1811-1855), Julia Ann Arnold (unknown-1838), and Harrison Arnold (1813-1835). Another daughter, Lucetta Taylor, is buried in Sutton, MA. Jerusha died at age 72 on April 11, 1860, in Sutton, MA.

Memorial Town Building (I Main Street)





Workers are replacing two of the large arched windows at the Memorial Town Building thanks to a grant from the town this year.

The original 12 over 12, single-pane, wooden sashed windows were replaced decades ago with the existing metal windows. The arched windows were replaced with a piece of plywood.

The new energy-efficient and UV-protected replacement windows replicate the original windows. Besides conserving energy, they will protect the irreplaceable artifacts on display inside from the harsh effects of sunlight.

Eight of the second floor 6 over 6 windows were replaced this September thanks to a grant from the Champlin Foundation.

More windows will be replaced as funds allow.

Although we enjoyed perfect weather, the crowd was smaller this year at Spooky Spirits Night. Nevertheless, those who came enjoyed a wonderful event!




